25 Years Ago

THE GRAEME OBREE WEEKEND

In the history of cycling there has only been one Scottish World Champion. Robert Millar has been 4th in the Road-Race, but Graeme has been professional pursuit champion twice - in 1993 and again in 1995 as well as twice holding the highly prestigious one-hour record. But being a champion, even World Champion, is not enough to guarantee a successful weekend.

When Graeme recently became sponsored by SCOTOIL, our chairman, Alan Campbell, asked Ian Davidson of SCOTOIL (who is now one of our members) if Graeme could do something for us in Aberdeen. The answer came quickly - yes, certainly. Ian Davidson immediately threw the resources of SCOTOIL and public relations experts behind the venture. Anyone of the 160 plus people in the hall that Friday will know that the sound and visuals were highly professional and a credit to the sport. But even that does not guarantee success. Yes, the added ingredient, of course, is the Graeme Obree personality and that guaranteed the build-up was entirely justified.

Graeme is a highly engaging, personable, articulate and humorous individual. In particular he took us through the feelings that he encountered when the UCI banned the Obree tuck position.

Even without a coach, team of doctors, equipment supplies, training sessions in the sun, etc, etc, etc, he has proved that someone from Scotland with the dedication and talent can make it to the very top.

An ordinary guy but extraordinary in the way he used his talents. Clearly someone who loves riding the bike - a real cyclist.

The following morning Graeme led a training run on a wet day

and spoke to all the riders until the last few miles when he allowed his legs to do the talking. He dropped everyone comprehensively - and he was on his mountain bike!

Histerical Reminiscences

(Part 28)

Alfredo Stephanini, aka Freddie Stephen, edited the *Scottish Clubman*, a magazine devoted to Scottish motorsport. Freddie also made ice-cream to a secret recipe.

In the late 19th century, the story goes, the Guilianotti family moved from Italy to Stonehaven where they soon established a confectioner and ice cream parlour. Though Freddie made the ice-cream his mother was the proprietor.

I got to know Freddie as long ago as the early 1960s. Before cycling took over, I'd a passion for motocross and car rallying and Freddie gave me access to events throughout the north-east.

Another string to Freddie's bow was freelance reporting and press photography. Once starting to compete I'd head out after the cycle race to Guilianotti's on Evan Street in Stonehaven where Freddie let me have access to his office. There I'd phone results through to the *P&J*, *Evening Express* and Anne Horne.

Anne lived in Glasgow. She'd been a formidable competitor in her day. Folk were terrified of her, but she had uses. Her day job also involved the papers and she'd pass the information on to National dailies and the cycling press.

I got to know Vi MacDonald when still at school. She was a local councillor in Stonehaven and her husband managed the TSB branch.

Charged with the task of sourcing adverts for my school's annual magazine the TSB came up trumps and Vi delivered the copy to me.

Once departing the haloed shrine of secondary education, I remained in contact with Vi and when I asked her to recommend that Stonehaven Council back a cycle event in the area, she heartily agreed.

The first event took place during the *R W Thomson Rally*, a weekend of events commemorating the genius of Thomson.

Robert William Thomson, born in Stonehaven in 1822, invented the fountain pen. That pen may be a bit archaic now but just ask Alan Gibb what I always had in my pocket.

Which reminds me of the night I spent in the quarry on Beattock Summit. Soaked and frozen, having tried to sleep through a snow-storm with nothing to protect me save for my trusty oilskin cycle cape, to my dismay I discovered my *Quink* charged *Parker Sonnet* had disappeared.

The pen was only a small part of Thomson's inventive life and most importantly for the world today he designed and built the earliest pneumatic tyres.

The cycle event sanctioned by Stonehaven Council, took riders round several laps of Swanley. An 11-mile circuit it is quite lumpy, though nothing dramatic, first on the Slug, then to follow the narrow winding road past Swanley and past the cottage I lived in.

Riding those roads every day would give me a distinct advantage. I knew every corner; every climb and I'd use this local knowledge to good effect at the right time.

On the third lap, a few of us in the leading group had just passed Snob Cottage, swept down the rapid descent past the Tentyhillock sign, see-sawed over the humpbacked bridge and lined up for the sharp left hander at the Clachanshiels road-end.

This was the moment. Kicking hard I'd make a break. The climb past Bossholes would see me establish enough distance to ride home alone and victorious.

Into the left hander the adhesion provided by Thomson's invention failed. Sliding tangentially, I eventually hit the tarmac and continued, bouncing over the grass verge underneath a spikey fence. *Steve MacQueen* had nothing on me as I came to a halt, limbs gouged and raked by the barbed wire.

The storm came late. Tearing winds blasted horizontal spicules of ice against my face. Pinpricks of blood appeared on my cheek. A shielding hand could only stop so many of the stabbing shards. Ecstasy. Those last few miles home were tough.

The storm blew itself out overnight. The morning dawned calm with everything hidden under a deep blanket of snow. Corniches curled over the tops of dykes. Through a sheltered forest where the snow lay less deep white stuff fanned out from the brake blocks. Then drifts, hedge high, blocked the Slug as I headed to work. Nothing else moved.

The drifts, brown, with wind-swept debris from fields, were packed rock hard and supported the bike.

A massive blow-out in the front tyre on the steep side of the Slug from Cairn Monearn saw me limp the few miles to Ian Marr's shop at Kirkton of Durris.

It could have been the speed of my descent and the centrifugal force in the rotating wheel that caused the tyre to expand and allowed the tube to climb out. It could have been bad luck. The four-inch split proved it wasn't just a snake bite or splinter of glass.

Ian Marr's shop has gone; the counter chopped to firewood, the shelves relegated to an outhouse, the space reclaimed as a living room.

These country shops were a Godsend. Before the days of the supermarket and the Open All Hours Coopie, folk relied on them for everyday provision. They'd sell tins of Spam, tins of prunes, Tilly lamp mantles, candles, pink paraffin and myriad other things necessary to survive. They have gone. They always closed on a Wednesday afternoon, and never stayed open beyond 5.30 in the afternoon.

Ian unlocked the door for me and though no tubes were stocked he did have a sheet of rubber patching and a tube of glue.

Then there was the time when heading home from the club, a Friday night reveller driving a Mini, nearly took my front wheel away as he dived across me. No doubt going to a late-night party, he accelerated along the lane leading to Auchlunies House just south of Ardoe.

Not far from there, somewhere between Stranog and Westside, I punctured. Of course, as often, I lacked the spare tube and, in the darkness, couldn't be bothered faffing with the repair.

So, climbing the dyke, I visited a wee derelict church just half a field away. There, I laboriously stuffed grass, twisted to rope, into the tyre.

The Mounth (Mountain) Roads, and there are many, cross the hills on the south side of the Dee valley. Some will have been there for a 1000 and more years; others maybe just a few hundred. But they are historically significant.

Edward Longshanks, the Hammer of the Scots, is reputed to have used the Cryne Corse Mounth from Drumlithie to Durris before he sacked Aberdeen in 1296. And later that year, returning south from the successful annexation of Kildrummy Castle, he is said to have left Deeside via the Firmounth which links Kincardine O'Neil with Glen Esk in Angus.

Then, in the Covenanting times, mid-17th century, the Marquess of Montrose brought 9000 men to Aberdeen along the Causeymounth, from Stonehaven to the Blue Hill at Bridge of Dee.

The Causeymounth is the furthest east, paralleling the main Aberdeen road. Its name comes from the causeway built across Haremoss just north of Portlethen.

Furthest west is Cairnwell, the Devil's Elbow road, linking Braemar with Spital of Glenshee. In between these two are more than a dozen others used as drove roads linking the farms on Deeside, and further north, with markets in Angus and Perthshire.

The Stonehaven area is known as the Fatherland of Burns. Clochnahill, a farm just south of Stonehaven, is where William Burns, Robert's father, was born. Robert's grandfather and several generations before, farmed Bogjurgan on the Auchenblae road.

The Crynecorse Mounth was used as a drove road from Kirkton of Durris to the markets at Paldy Fair, Drumlithie. It passes close by Bogjurgan Farm. From here I'd often led parties of schoolkids on their first off-road experience.

Just above Cleughead, on the Braes o'Blaerourie, half a mile into the journey we entered the trees. Getting them to stack their bikes tidily we sat in a circle.

Trying to create an atmosphere I asked them to be quiet, to listen. Could they hear the jangle of horse harness; the rumble of wagons? Listening intently nothing could be heard; not even a breath of wind in the trees. Then a gentle to-whit-to-woo broke the silence. Their heads turned as one, to see a baby tawny owl sitting watching us.

The German Bakery is passed and out of the town the Kali Ghandaki gravel pan spreads widely. Pedalling down onto it the vastness gave us, once again, a tremendous feeling of isolation yet all around are hundreds of pilgrims now heading south from Muktinath.

Some of the pilgrims can hardly walk. We'd already seen a blind man being led by a companion. Speaking with them we learn that they are brothers and have walked from the plains of India. A man carries his crippled wife.

Spotting a few Nepalis (Indians) well out on the gravel I changed direction from the beaten path to go to speak with them. Realisation had dawned that in the Kali Ghandaki is where fossils are abundant. They told me to search for the black stones and showed me how to open them.

Finding one I broke it in two - nothing. Then another was split, and another. One of the chaps showed me one he'd found. It had a gold trace in the centre. He showed me one with a fossilised ammonite.

Picking up another, smooth, black rounded stone about the size of a lime, I hammered at it. It split and falling open I found a perfect ammonite traced with gold. Of course, I was not fooled. Yellow coloured it might be but in truth it carried the name of *fool's gold*, iron pyrites. These fossils may be common, but I regard my find as one in a lifetime. As the searchers told me "You find one with gold you be rich man."

Kagbeni is the fortress town from where trekkers head towards Muktinath and the Thorung La on the Annapurna circuit. A few, a very few, also head further north past a sign which says, "Restricted Area - No Entry".

Collectivism means poorly managed farming methods. Cycling from Novgorod to Moscow few tractors were seen and implements were old. Much of the work is still done by hand. That aside, people appeared to manage with all the houses well cared for and each with well stocked gardens. Entrepreneurs sold produce and souvenirs by the road-side.

In Moscow, the mayor is desperate to be remembered for improving the facade of his city. It means that churches are being repaired and roads maintained, museums are being made more public and dour Scotsmen are allowed to dance in Red Square. But what he isn't doing is improving public services.

The privilege was ours to be allowed inside the Burns Unit of Children's Hospital No9. It is dreadful. The charity for which Alastair and I were doing our little bit is rebuilding the laundry at this hospital. This is to allow bed linen to be cleaned and maintained at hand rather than disappear for months into a corrupt and inadequate service elsewhere. The building should be back in operation within three months. There are distressing shortages. Dressings, which here, would be discarded, are washed and re-used, often makeshift bandages must be utilised. Dressings are only changed weekly.

One mother allowed us to talk with her daughter. The family had been sitting in their living room in Grozny, the capital of Chechnya, when a stray shell came through the window. The girl was badly burned over all her body. Now past the worst, her cries of pain as her dressings were removed, brought tears to our eyes and made us wonder how some more help can be given.

Until the new states have gone through their period of transition to a new enlightened management it is unlikely that hospitals will receive more help than the minimum they are getting. It is impossible to comprehend the cost of improvements, maintenance of equipment, provision of drugs and dressings.
